## **How Alumni Involvement Saved Kappa Psi Chapter:**

All too often, fraternity brothers consider their chapter careers over when they walk through the quad at graduation. They gave it 4 years, and now its time to move into the real world. However, I can give you first hand experience that undergraduate members of TKE need the advisement of their Alumni Fraters more than anyone realizes.

My chapter ran into a few misfortunes this year that we would not have been able to survive as chapter and as men without the past leaders of the fraternity. This past spring, the Kappa Psi chapter was informed about a formal investigation of the chapter taking place. There were some allegations of hazing that happened to occur the week before the Regional Leadership Conference in Philadelphia. This was not just a normal investigation, it was one where the charter of the Kappa Psi chapter hung in the balance. At that conference, I was able to interact with past e-board members, Board of Advisors officers, as well as one of our notable Alumni, Jim Totten, who is a past grand e-board member, order of the golden eagle, and now sits on the Educational Foundation board.

I took the time I had with these more experienced fraters to talk through the problems that were facing our chapter and changing our education program from what it was to what it should be. It took an investigation to figure out that the chapter needed to move forward. I would not have been able to come up with the new direction with my own e-board, I needed people that knew how our chapter and Greek system worked, but were removed from it to figure out what needed to happen for the best of the chapter.

Together with the Board of Advisors, we were able to save the chapter from future problems. Not only did they help me plan this, but actually came to the next chapter meeting to help implement it to the brotherhood. They explained where it came from, and how we developed the ideas for the new education plan.

The major challenge of Alumni involvement is balancing what the chapter wants you to do and what you should do for the best of the chapter. The best of the chapter is too often not what the undergraduate members think it is. It is not the best parties and the most girls. The best of the chapter are the decisions that are going to make the chapter stronger 5 years from now, not today. It is making the decisions that some people may not be ready for, but know deep down it's what needs to happen.

All too often, the undergraduate members want someone to give them money for t-shirts and buy them drinks at happy hour. The alumni's job goes much deeper than that, as a voice of reason, and a voice of someone who has seen the chapter thrive, and at some points, struggle. Alumni serve as a valuable resource to the undergraduate members, but need to make sure they handle the position responsibly. Sometimes, alumni have to be the bad guy, doing what isn't popular to provide a brighter future.

Perhaps the biggest problem facing alumni that want to get involved is a full time job, and sometimes a family that requires most of their time. There is no such thing as a little involvement in a chapter. The phone call you make to the chapter Prytanis or the person that used to hold your position can just show the undergrad frater that they have someone in their corner. That can keep them going. Most Board of Advisors meet once or twice a semester on a weekend. The time commitment can be as little as showing up for RCB just to show the newly initiated members that there are people looking out for them when they get out of college.

The point is, alumni involvement is one of the aspects that turns a chapter around, or can turn a good chapter into a great chapter. TKE volunteers really allow this fraternity to truly be the Fraternity for Life, with a lifelong commitment. You never know, the brothers that you are mentoring today, could be the ones that end up working for you tomorrow.

### **06/05/2006 TKE Remembers Frater Ronald Reagan**

February 6, 1911 - June 5, 2004

INDIANAPOLIS, IN. - More than 200,000 living Tekes join a grateful nation in celebrating the life of Frater Ronald Wilson Reagan, who passed away at his California home two years ago today, on Saturday, June 5, 2004. Reagan was initiated into Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity's Iota Chapter, Eureka College, on February 25, 1929, as its 169th member.

In addition to the strong leadership he displayed as the 40th President of the United States (1981-89) and during his two terms as Governor of California (1967-75), Reagan was a staunch supporter of the Fraternity and active in TKE from 1929 through his passing into the Chapter Eternal. He served his undergraduate chapter as rush chairman, member educator, and president. After graduation, Reagan continued his involvement in "the Fraternity for Life" through regular support of the TKE Educational Foundation, in making several films and videos for TKE, and as Chairman of the Grand Prytanis Advisory Committee in the 1970's. During his presidency, Reagan welcomed his fellow Fraters to the White House and visited Tekes and TKE chapter houses throughout the country.

He received the Fraternity's highest honor - the Order of the Golden Eagle - and was a Charter Member of the Life Loyal Teke program. TKE continues to honor Reagan's contributions through the Ronald Reagan Leadership Award scholarship, which is presented annually to an outstanding undergraduate Teke. In 2001, the membership of the Fraternity adopted the Alzheimer's Association as TKE's official philanthropy, and took up sponsorship of an Alzheimer's research project within the association's Ronald & Nancy Reagan Research Institute.

In reflecting on Reagan's life and contributions, then TKE Grand Prytanis Mark C. Romig, upon hearing of his passing in 2004, stated "Frater Reagan was a true Teke in every sense of the word. He lead by example in his everyday life, and left a tremendously positive mark not only on America, but throughout the entire world. Tau Kappa Epsilon has always been honored to call him our Frater and our friend. He will be sorely missed, but his legacy of optimism and positive values-based leadership will live on, touching the lives of countless millions in the years to come."

Please remember Frater Reagan on this day and everyday for the great contributions he has made to the worldwide community.

## **6/14/2006 Manitoba Premier Honored**

Manitoba Premier and Frater Gary Doer (Zeta-Iota) was recognized for his unwavering support of Israel at Tuesday's Negev Gala 2006 at Centennial Concert Hall. As premier, he has supported Jewish people in Manitoba with certain measures and worked to garner support of Israel staying a free nation.

He received a special award during the gala, which is the Jewish community's largest fundraising event.

Proceeds from the gala, which featured an awards presentation and live entertainment, will go to an initiative between Manitoba and the Jewish National Fund of Canada (JNF).

They recently agreed to a three-year, \$1-million deal to improve the environment in both regions. Forestry, water innovation and rapid growth greenhouse technology are key elements of the research partnership.

Frater Doer was initiated at the University of Manitoba in 1969. In June, 2003, Doer was re-elected to a second term as Manitoba Premier with an increased majority in the Provincial Legislature. He was first elected Premier in September, 1999 after serving as Leader of the Official Opposition since 1988.

Premier Doer remains a committed partner in strengthening his community. He has served as vice-president of the Manitoba Special Olympics; board member of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers football Club; Prairie Theatre Exchange; the Niagara Institute; and, the Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba.

Premier Doer is married to Ginny Devine. They have two children.

## **6/15/2006 Byrd Truly the Elder Statesman**

Robert C. Byrd, a champion of classical oratory in the Senate and pork barrel spending back home, yesterday became the longest-serving senator in U.S. history. The West Virginia Democrat marked his 17,327th day in the Senate by visiting his wife's grave and then listening to several colleagues praise his career. Uncharacteristically for a man who has rhapsodized about spring, Mother's Day and countless other topics in the Senate chamber, Byrd left the floor without speaking, struggling to maintain his composure. "My darling wife, I just wish she had lived to see this day," he told reporters as he left. Erma Ora James Byrd, who died March 25, would have turned 89 yesterday.

Byrd, 88, eclipsed the late Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.) in Senate tenure. He long has held the record for the most Senate votes cast, and Majority Leader Bill Frist (R-Tenn.) said yesterday that he "has held more leadership positions than any other senator."

Byrd aims to keep setting records, running this fall for a ninth six-year term, which would end when he is 95. In a state whose legislature named him "West Virginian of the 20th Century," Byrd is generally favored to defeat GOP business executive John Raese.

Although he is frail and walks with two canes, Byrd still gives theatrical speeches on the importance of preserving the Senate's traditional powers and other issues dear to him. Some of his most emotional orations in the past three years have involved the Iraq war, which he opposed from the start and considers a historic misadventure. He often rips President Bush, whom he has called "dangerous, reckless and arrogant," for launching the invasion with an incomplete assessment of Iraq's weapons.

Beyond Capitol Hill, Byrd's greatest legacy is in the asphalt, concrete, steel and hefty payrolls of the scores of federal projects he has steered to West Virginia from his Appropriations Committee seat, to which his ally Lyndon B. Johnson appointed him. He once said he wanted to be the state's "billion-dollar industry." Analysts say he exceeded the goal, planting major facilities for the FBI, the Treasury Department, Internal Revenue Service and many other agencies in the Mountain State.

Byrd's legacy has its darker sides, most notably his membership in the Ku Klux Klan as a young man eager to enter politics in the 1940s. He repeatedly calls it "the greatest mistake of my life" and acknowledges it will be part of his obituary.

Byrd's love of quoting the Bible, the Constitution, Shakespeare, Cicero, Thucydides and others is all the more notable because he entered office with one semester of college completed. He spent a dozen years in the West Virginia legislature and U.S. House before winning election to the Senate in November 1958. He earned a law degree at American University while he mastered the Senate's rules and climbed its leadership ranks. Byrd co-wrote a four-volume history of the Senate and published a hefty autobiography last year, "Robert C. Byrd: Child of the Appalachian Coalfields." In an unusually testy exchange in 2002 with then-Treasury Secretary Paul H. O'Neill, Byrd attacked what he called executive branch abuses and arrogance, adding: "I lived in a house without electricity, too. No running water, no telephone, a little wooden outhouse. . . . I started out in life without any rungs in the bottom ladder."

Yesterday, Byrd played the humble official hoping to win one more election. "The people of West Virginia," he told reporters, "are the people to whom I owe the greatest of praise."

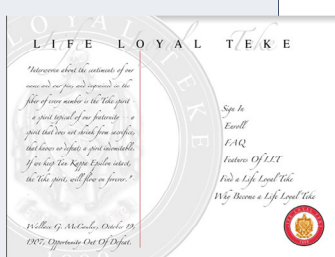

# LIFE LOYAL TEKE

## Overview of the Program

Life Loyal Teke is a program of the Fraternity, whose purpose is to gain commitments from each alumnus to support the Vision, Mission, and Purpose of Tau Kappa Epsilon.

Currently, the vast majority of TKE's operating budget is derived from undergraduate fees. Tau Kappa Epsilon lags behind most other fraternities in alumni support. The Life Loyal Teke program is designed to better set the expectation that Tekes will contribute to Tau Kappa Epsilon. Through the program TKE hopes to gain more alumni advisors for our chapters, as well as resources to support the alumni developmental and educational programming efforts of the Fraternity. The Life Loyal program aims to set the expectation that support of the Fraternity is a lifetime commitment, which should provide better services to our chapters, strengthen the ties of brotherhood and make TKE itself a better fraternity.

As the "Fraternity for Life" ritual is now seen as the transition point from active collegiate membership to alumnus status, the program will stress the notion that one truly dedicates themselves as a "Life Loyal Teke" when they make this transition, and that continued support of the Fraternity is a lifelong obligation. Life Loyal Teke membership does not imply that the lifetime commitment for financial support of the Fraternity has ended, but that continued support of TKE and the TKE Educational Foundation is an expected membership responsibility for every Teke, especially from Life Loyal Tekes.

## What is the Life Loyal Teke Program?

- Life Loyal Teke is a new program for alumni and graduating seniors that seeks to build on the vital traditions of Tau Kappa Epsilon as the Fraternity for Life
- As Life Loyal Tekes, the alumni Fraters who participate have an opportunity to strengthen both their local TKE Chapters and the International Fraternity, thus creating a stronger bond for both alumni and undergraduate Fraters.
- Those who enroll in the Life Loyal Teke program are recognized for their exemplary commitment. While supporting the Fraternity, they also receive additional benefits associated with the Life Loyal Teke program.
- With your commitment, you'll join the ranks of those dedicated Tekes who have built and sustained the great Fraternity we now enjoy. And most importantly, you will help ensure that our indomitable Teke spirit continues to flow on forever.

## How much does the program cost to enroll?

- The regular one time price for enrollment is \$395 for graduating seniors, alumni 25 years old and younger, and those who graduated within five years of enrolling. The enrollment for all other TKE alumni is \$495.
- To reward early enrollment, there is a special Charter Membership available. This is only available until September 1, 2003. Charter members will receive a special charter membership card and certificate.

## Is there a payment plan to ease the cost of joining?

- Yes, if your enrollment fee is \$395 you can elect to pay \$39.00 per month for 12 months. If your enrollment fee is \$495 you can elect to pay \$49.00 per month for 12 months.

### **What are the benefits to me as a Life Loyal Teke?**

- Enrollment in a special lifetime Fraternity communication program which will include issues of THE TEKE magazine or the e-Teke (a soon to be released digital version of the magazine) and Life Loyal, a special digital newsletter with program news and information.
- A special members only website where you will have access to the following:
  - An Internet directory database of Life Loyal Tekes throughout the Grand Chapter.
  - A special TKE online Career and Job Center.
- Alumni networking events with prominent Tekes.
- A special Life Loyal Teke Lapel Insignia and membership card.
- By enrolling you will be giving back to your local chapter and the International Fraternity and helping both current and future Fraters enjoy the experience of being a TKE.
- A portion of your contribution is earmarked as a charitable contribution to the TKE Educational Foundation and hence is tax advantaged (may be deducted for income tax purposes for those who itemize their taxes).

### **How does my local chapter benefit from my enrollment?**

- By joining enrolling you will help current and future Fraters from your chapter. The program is structured to insure an optimal balance between Local Chapter support and Grand Chapter support.
- More specifically, \$100 of the \$395 or \$200 of the \$495 will be placed in a separate fund. This fund will help build a sustaining gift to endow collegiate programming in housing and academic grants (library material and other tools such as computers, leadership programming and member scholarships) for your chapter.

### **Where does this money go if my chapter is currently not operating?**

- The \$100 or \$200 designated for your chapter will still go to your chapter. The TEF has set up special LLT accounts for each chapter in TKE.
- If your chapter is currently closed and you enroll you will be helping to ensure a successful recolonization effort in the future.

### **Why were these local funds established?**

- As we developed this program over the past year, we heard very clearly that alumni and undergraduates alike wanted to see more support flowing to the local chapters as well as the Grand Chapter.
- To assist our chapters at the local level, designated funds have been established within the TKE Educational Foundation for each chapter in support of these educational endeavors. A portion of your Life Loyal one-time enrollment fee will be allocated to these funds, which will provide over the years a direct benefit to your chapter. Any additional gifts made after enrolling in LLT can be specifically earmarked to go into one of these local chapter funds.

### **How can I be sure that there will be lifetime communication from TKE?**

- Presently, a portion of the enrollment fee received from each Life Loyal Teke will be placed in a designated reserve account, protected by proposed Black Book Legislation. The amount will be monitored and determined by the Grand Council.
- The Life Loyal Communications Reserve Account will only be used to fund the special lifetime communications program including publications and digital communications.
- A portion of your enrollment fee will go towards maintaining TKE's Life Loyal website, which will give you better interactive information from the Fraternity for Life.

One of the measures advocated by National Founder Wallace G. McCauley was the publication of a quarterly magazine called *THE TEKE*. His proposal met with immediate approval and the first issue was published in January 1908, with Clyde M. Leach as the editor.

Although *THE TEKE* has been packaged differently throughout the years, its purpose has remained the same...to keep the members of our great Fraternity informed about TKE.
