What is a Co-occurring Disorder?
A person who has at least one mental health disorder and who also abuses drugs or alcohol

1 Mental Health Disorder
Examples:
• Bipolar
• Anxiety
• Depression
• PTSD
• Schizophrenia

2 Substance Abuse Problem
Examples:
• Alcohol
• Opiates
• Marijuana
• Cocaine
• Meth

COD-Cohort students earn MSW's through completing hybrid classes in 3-day weekends/month (Fri, Sat, Sun) over 3-years. Curriculum: Psycho-education regarding SAMI for clients and families; behaviorally tailored interventions (meds) as recovery tools - motivational enhancement, stages of change; CBT treatments, etc. Client choice, active participation in their recovery (person-centered, recovery-oriented practice); individualized recovery plans - integrated stage-wise services, flexible, variable: based on clients' wants, goals, aspirations, strengths, resources, skills - adult roles as full-fledged citizens.

Co-Occurring Disorders: The Critical Need

According to SAMHSA, the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, an estimated 50% to 75% of patients in substance abuse treatment programs have a co-occurring mental illness, while 20% to 50% of patients in mental health treatment have co-occurring substance use.

Despite the high incidence, **most people with co-occurring disorders do not receive appropriate treatment for both mental disorders and substance use. Many receive no treatment of any kind.**

It was in response to this critical need that the SCSU Social Work Department and the Connecticut Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS) developed the MSW Cohort Program in Co-Occurring Disorders. The goal of the program is to prepare social workers who provide effective, comprehensive, integrated, and evidence-based services for adults with co-occurring disorders (CODs).

The COD Cohort program allows professionals in the field of mental health and addictions to earn their MSW degree while maintaining employment. COD Cohort participants meet for a three-day period each month (typically Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays) for three calendar years including one summer. The COD Cohort program emphasizes an adult learning paradigm in which courses are taken sequentially, participants build a strong learning community, and self-discipline and self-directed learning are keys to success.

Program Design

Participants in the COD Cohort program complete the same requirements as students in the traditional MSW program, however courses are delivered in a format that is designed for employed professionals.

- The Cohort program meets three-days per month (typically Friday, Saturday, & Sunday)
- Most courses are delivered in a hybrid format (partly on campus and partly online)
- Syllabi, readings, and written assignments are provided two to three weeks prior to the start of each class
- Participants interact online with each other and with the instructor in between class sessions
- The final written assignment is usually due two to three weeks following the last class

Field Education

Field education is tightly integrated into the curriculum of the COD Cohort program.

- Participants complete their 1,100 hours of field practice over two calendar years
- Field placements include DMHAS or agencies contracted by DMHAS
- Field placements may be held in the participant's place of employment, provided that educational responsibilities and supervision are separate and distinct from those of the participant's job
