We're delighted that you chose us - joining the 225 Promise Scholars enrolled at Southern this fall – I promise you that you won't regret your decision.

More than 80 percent of our Promise Scholars are first-generation to college. And they are doing well!

I'm particularly proud to note that today we will be honoring the first Southern student to receive the Legacy Award. This is the longest-standing honor bestowed by New Haven Promise, which annually rewards recent graduates who have demonstrated a deep commitment to their studies, fellow scholars and the City of New Haven.

Congratulations to Rigoberto Escalera, who graduated cum laude this past May with a degree in business administration and a concentration in accounting!

Ten members of our incoming cohort - known as Emerging Leaders - will also be participating in a residential leadership program that will cover their housing expenses for the academic year. In return they'll be providing mentorship and outreach to Southern's Promise Scholars and to New Haven high school students.

With this new class, Southern will have had 502 Promise Scholars to date. Only one other institution has more – UCONN (much bigger place). Not too bad. We are proud of that fact, because providing access to higher

education and creating pathways to success for students from all walks of life is what we do - and it's what we have done for the last 125 years.

The opportunity to attend college is one that most people in this country, and indeed across the world, still do not have. So don't take it for granted.
