observe the services. Some services were in English and others in Hebrew. I observed the setting of music, age demographics, musical instruments, etc. I interviewed rabbis and community members and discussed the roles that music played, talked about the music that was chosen and why it was chosen. I experienced what every week looks like and what does "traditional" music sound like to these different denominations.

How did you get involved in this project? I received an email from the SCSU Undergraduate Research mentioning this opportunity and how there would be faculty mentoring and I would receive a grant for the study material. The integrity of work inspires me!

How much time have you dedicated to this project? This required a lot of time. I thought about it as activity. I would bring the information into classes as I feel it happened simultaneously with classes. The services were approximately 1-2 hours each. One service lasted 3 hours. I attended Zoom meetings, visits, reading translations, data collecting, etc. My brother also joined me at the services and it was interesting to hear his findings. Having a second person there gave the project more dimension and made it more rounded so I was able to get two perspectives. He saw the emotions and I was looking at the readings.

Where can we find out more? I am currently writing the paper which should be approximately 10-15 pages in length when done. I would like to do presentations at a conference.

Jocelyn Rich, class of 2025, B.A. Music

Jocelyn hails from Seymour, CT. She released her first album on Spotify on Valentine's Day 2024. We asked her about the experience, her inspirations, and musical journey.



What skills have you learned that will help you in your signing career? I joined Chamber Singers and the University Choir this year which has helped with my pitch. I have done self breathing exercises to increase my diaphragm. I started on the guitar and taught myself to sing in key. No one is a bad singer if you practice and train yourself.

What kind of singer would you classify yourself as? Both indie and pop. I am also trying R & B.

What inspires you? Artists such as Raye from the UK. She started with house music and also sings blues. The passion in her music inspires me as well. My goal is to inspire others and connect with their emotions and experiences.

How was the journey to the album release? It was intense and I put pressure on myself. There were a lot of sleepless nights with quiet night recordings of different chord ideas and melodies. Sometimes the chords and melodies intertwined. I would first mumble rhythms and the words came afterwards. I would format the song in my head. The album was supposed to be called the *Ten Stages of Grief* but then came *Shades of Blue* which show the levels of

How long did it take to record the album? It was about six to eight months of coming up with ideas, recording, mixing, etc. Hollywood expects a certain sound but when an artist mixes and works on developing their sound, and if it sounds good, people will know that the mixing is technical.

Nathan Mensah, MA, MT-BC, joined the faculty at SCSU in spring 2023 and also teaches at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College. He provides music therapy services at Yale New Haven Children's Hospital and St. Vincent's Behavioral Health Services as part of Hartford Healthcare. Nate works on a wide variety of pediatric units, and also provides services to adults with mental health and dual diagnosis substance use disorders. He regularly presents at music therapy conferences and enjoys providing online education opportunities through organizations such as Music Therapy

Ed, Pediatric Music Therapy, and the Music Therapy Spot. He specializes in topics related to clinical musicianship, genre and stylistic authenticity, and culture-informed music history. He currently performs with the Yale Medical Symphony Orchestra, and composes and arranges music for a variety of projects.
