The College of Education (COE) mission values applying skills that impact learning and development – technological skills being an important component of our vision as a college. Across the programs in the COE technology skills and strategies are reviewed as essential components to effective teaching. Candidates engage with technology in multiple ways: application within course assignments and format, discussion of implementation in class, and integration in clinical experiences. All candidates have access to Blackboard, the learning management system, where faculty model electronic organization of course tools, classroom materials, grading, and feedback. Blackboard is utilized for data collection and submission of learning evidence. In addition to this core technology, instructors integrate a wide variety of other technology applications with a variety of purposes. Some students have utilized NearPod, Socrative, and Kahoot!, all tools promoting active learning. Other courses infuse technology to support candidates' own learning. Although these instructional moments are powerful and interspersed throughout the programs. We continue to advance toward the goals of integrating authentic modeling by the instructors, increased collaboration with community partners, and utilizing technology to make meaningful instructional decisions across multiple courses in a candidate's program, specifically for differentiation. After lesson planning in courses, clinical work provides a pivotal experience for candidates to not only plan for but experience the impact of technology. The CPAST and preCPAST (Candidate Performance assessment in student teaching) forms are utilized to assess their technology implementation process in the field. In addition to those assessments, students apply their professional technology skills in the organization and preparation of their edTPA portfolio. Beyond the CPAST and edTPA, student teaching candidates in Special Education evaluate the use of assistive technology within their placements to dete

community and are encouraged to share with their cooperating teachers. Universal Design for learning is infused throughout some of the programs. This concept promotes the idea of designing all lessons/learning experiences right from the beginning to be accessible to the broadest range of learners. Candidates are taught to provide multiple means of representation (to present all information in a variety of formats/media), to provide multiple means of expression (all students to demonstrate knowledge in a variety of ways, not just through writing), and to provide multiple means of engagement (design learning opportunities to engage learners such as working with partners or small groups as well as letting students select the type of material from which they want to learn specific information). Candidates in several programs also learn to consider a broader definition of 21st century literacy and are required to design instruction that integrates multiple forms of media and alternate forms of expression (in addition to traditional print text). Technology integration in the classroom, managing and analyzing data and improving teaching for the purpose of the principles of UDL continue to be a focus.

All candidates take one of the following courses depending on their program, SED 225 – Introduction to Exceptionalities, or SED 502 – Introduction to Exceptional Students. Each of these courses focuses on addressing the legal, educational, and instructional needs of all students with exceptionalities. Our candidates are prepared to design instructional activities to meet identified needs, and modify instruction so students can participate successfully in the least restrictive environment.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act*.

All certification candidates get the opportunity to participate as a member of individualized education program teams as an activity in one of the courses listed above.

All certification candidates, except Bilingual Ed candidates take either EDU 471 – Supporting English Learners or the graduate-level equivalent EDU 571 – Teaching ELLs in the Regular Ed Classroom to ensure they are able to meet the needs of students who have limited English proficiency. All Special Ed certification candidates take one of the following courses SED 225 - Introduction to Exceptionalities, or SED 502 - Introduction to Exceptional Learners. Each of these courses focuses on the historical and legislative foundations of special education, characteristics and instructional needs of students with exceptionalities. Our candidates are prepared to conduct diagnostic assessments and design instructional activities to meet identified needs and modify instruction so students can participate successfully in the least restrictive environment. Students complete clinical field experience components in the following courses: SED 365 Basic Principles of Academic Assessment and Remediation for Exceptional Individuals or SED 509 –Mathematics Instruction for Exceptional Learners, SED 435 Language Arts for Exceptional Individuals and lesson planning or SED 521 – Diagnostic Assessment of Exceptional Learners, and SED 449 School Based Experience in Special Education or SED 519 – Clinical Practices in Developmental Disabilities. There are 5 additional Special Education courses at the undergraduate level and six additional courses at the graduate levels that prepare candidates to develop, implement and evaluate individualized educational programs, collect and analyze data to make instructional decisions, develop positive behavior supports and interventions, utilize assistive technology, plan for post-secondary transition and collaborate with families and other school professionals for students with exceptionalities.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities*Education Act.

Our students are also required to take SED 325 – Curriculum and Methods for Exceptional Individuals, or SED 504 – Curriculum and Program Planning for Exceptional Learners, which focuses on developing annual individualized educational goals and objectives for learners with exceptionalities, evidence-based instructional strategies, and effective participation as a member of students' IEP teams.

c. Effectively teach students who are limited English proficient.

All candidates also take EDU 471- English Language Learner or the graduate-level equivalent EDU 571 – Teaching ELLs in the Regular Ed Classroom to ensure they are able to meet the needs of students who have limited English proficiency. To complement the coursework, several of the courses candidates enroll in have clinical fieldwork.
